Improper Procedures Practised by the Portsmouth Police

Lightweight penalty after being assaulted

I was stalked every single day over a period measured in years¹. I was assaulted three times and on the third occasion I genuinely thought for few seconds that I had lost my eye. For this latter assault, the police awarded the stalker a caution, as though somehow I am a 3rd class citizen -this was obviously no deterrent²

Prosecuting me without telling me what I have done to breach the law

I attempted to garner witnesses to the above-mentioned stalking with a view to taking legal action (the police had refused to help). The police responded by giving me with a caution for 'derogatory remarks' despite the fact that I considered my actions to be bona-fide (and still do, in the absence of any statement to the contrary from the police). Their procedure is cheap, nasty and quick - and there was one immediate consideration : pleading not guilty would have resulted in my stalker founding out my new address. Soon after, I discovered that the lawyer appointed for me was very mediocre – since then I have tried to find out what I have actually done to break the law, but the police refuse to tell me. This information is my democratic right. Franz Kafka wrote a book centered on someone who is prosecuted without ever being told what he has done wrong – and that was obviously considered weird even during the time of the Austrian-Hungarian empire. Prosecuting me is no deterrent to this potential stalker, it is likely to encourage him.³

The Police did not disclose everything to me at the time of my arrest

Some time later, I discovered that the police have accused me of 'derogatory comments' in a letter to the City Council This letter does not exist. You have to disclose all information to the accused at the time of their arrest – you cannot just place such accusations on a police record, bypassing the 'accused' completely. What else is on my record, I would love to know⁴

¹ This involved continuous door slamming, following me in every single time I entered the kitchen, a torrent of abuse. When he found out that I had problems with breathing, he filled the air with smoky substances, and worse (metallic-smelling)

² When news of this practice 'hit the fan' for the first time, we learnt locally that a man in Gosport had opened his door and was assaulted by someone he had never met before. Despite his rather obvious injuries, the attacker was given a caution. This was revealed to be widespread practice, and included burglars found red-handed burgling a house

The Police will not acknowledge information on sympathy for terrorism

As a part of his twitter tirades, the other party expressed support for the likes of Abu Hamza, al Qaeda, and similar. For starters, this is obvious a direct threat to me⁵, but the police refuse to acknowledge receipt of this information – I have made such a request countless times, probably into three figures by now. At the time of the London Bridge atrocities, there were stories to the effect that some people had an inkling of the participants offender’s potential actions – if so, there is a possibility that could be enduring lifelong guilt that maybe they could have done more to let the police know their suspicions. Likewise here, I will not be have peace of mind until I know that the police have actually recognized this information..

ANALOGOUS ERRORS MADE BY POLICE

Shana Grice : was fined by the police in Sussex for complaining about a stalker, only for the stalker to murder her

Bristol : in a recent case, a couple of police officers were sacked after continually believing that the victim (Bijan Ebrahimi) of a stalker was the person causing the problems, a belief they retained right up to the moment that Ebrahimi was murdered

- What I am requesting is not difficult but they are out of their depth. Because they are out their depth on an issue like this, imagine how much further they would be out of their depth in a ‘more serious’ issue⁶.
- The attitude of the police is very much in line with those who believe that customer service in this country is in its infancy
- The accusations against me (like many stories) grow in the telling. A certain Sergeant Mark Brearley, rang me up and accused me of calling the other party a ‘bastard’. This is factually incorrect⁷ but was the main point of Brearley’s accusations against me
- During his Twitter messages, the other party stated that during his time in a mental institution, he had been diagnosed as a psychopath. Although I don’t know whether this is true or not, the potential implications are obvious
- Ultimately, grievances like mine are allowed to fester because there is no independent body to which the general public can complain about the police⁸ (the half-baked IPCC was abolished by Cameron)

⁸ It is not just the ‘accused’ who suffer from this democratic deficit. Victims of crime also have nowhere to complain. Take, for example, the case of Harold Shipman who was let off by the police despite him having murdered about 300 people. He was re-arrested after he had murdered about 6 more, but the officers who made such a pig’s ear of the original investigation appear not to have been punished in any way.
